LAWRENCE PUBLIC LIBRARY OBJERVER REPORT MARCH 21, 2011

Library Director Bruce Flanders is reaching out to community organizations to update the public on the library expansion and renovation project. A "state of the library" presentation will be delivered at the City Commission meeting in April. The library hopes to host the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors monthly breakfast meeting on May 25.

Susan Brown has been hired as the library's Marketing Director and Rachel Smalter Hall is the library's Adult Programming Librarian. Both are new positions.

The Library along with other commu-

nity partners encourages everyone to participate in "Read Across Lawrence 2011" by reading, discussing, and watching Harper Lee's "To Kill a Mockingbird".

Gould Evans reported getting public feedback on the new library design. The concern is the proportion of the garage, the entry sequence to the library, how the transit hub would fit into the space allowed, safety issues and how it would look in comparison to the surrounding area. Gould Evans will have more meetings with the public and individual groups, following with a design drawing by the end of May.

LEAGUE MEMBER RECEIVES TRAINING

LWV-D/C member, Kay Hale, completed a training program offered by the League of Women Voters of the United States on March 25–27 in Providence, Rhode Island. The purpose of the training program was to address two core challenges facing the League. They are: membership recruitment and leadership development.

League Legislative E- Reports were attached to agenda.



LAND USE COMMITTEE REPORT MARCH 2011 MEETING

The Land Use Committee (LUC) met at the Merc on Saturday, March 26 at 4:00 p.m. We discussed the March Planning Commission (PC) agenda items and decided to send three letters.

intensive district, but because the site is in a location near somewhat sensitive uses we suggested that its district be conditioned to selectively limit its permitted uses. OUTCOME: the PC approved the rezoning unanimously with no conditions.

(2) Our second letter dealt with Item <a href="No. 2" a href="

frontage--a small business district--with residential uses confined to the upper levels. Because of the very specific requirements of the MU District and the complications inherent in coordinating multiple ownerships, we suggested that the Secondary Development Zone, which is less re-

strictive, would be more appropriate for this situation. We also suggested that the MU District itself, especially the Primary Development Zone, will be difficult to apply to situations like this, and accomplishing the redevelopment of the area would be facilitated if we had a more flexible overlay mixed use district. OUTCOME: the PC approved five MU Districts unanimously, and the sixth, Bullwinkles, was approved, but with two negative votes. The two commissioners' objections were based on their wishes to condition the Bullwinkle tavern for restrictions on business hours and environmental impacts.

(3) The most controversial issue of this PC Agenda was Item No. 3, the RM32 District Text Amendment (TA), which had been sent back from the City Commission for reconsideration by the PC. The original proposal by the developer who requested this TA would completely remove the "cap" or upper limit on the density of 32 units an acre--the density limit of the current RM32 District. The argument for allowing this increase in density was that it would allow rehabilitation of older existing apartment buildings to meet the present demand of one- and two-bedroom units and that the actual number of residents on a site would not increase. Staff proposed that increasing the allowable density in RM32 Districts could be done by reducing the density value per unit by half for one and two bedroom apartments. With this change, Planning staff had recommended approval of the TA, and their assessment was that the parking (one space per bedroom) and other requirements would limit the number of units possible on any one property. The City Commission sent this TA back to the PC with a number of questions. In response, staff added the provision of capping the allowable density

to 48 units, total, rather than allowing an unlimited increase of units.

Objections from the Oread Neighborhood, where most of the RM32 Districts are located, were that this approach has too many undesirable consequences. One predictable outcome of permitting higher densities would be the loss of single-

family structures and the predominant historic smalllot scale of the Oread Neighborhood by encouraging lot consolidation for building larger apartments. It's a complicated issue, but important, because the change would affect not just the Oread Neighborhood, but all RM32 Districts throughout the city. In a letter that we sent last year in December, we suggested that the amendment should be limited to existing apartment buildings in RM32 Districts needing renovation and that use of the optional increased density could specifically be limited through adding a provision to the Land Development Code, Article 5 rather than applying to all RM32 Districts. In our current letter to the PC on this issue we referred to our previous December letter. OUTCOME: this item was deferred until the May PC meeting.

LAND USE COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

The Land Use Committee met every month during the annual period of February, 2010 through February, 2011 with the exception of July, 2010 and January 2011. Our meeting place and time was at the Community Mercantile general

meeting room from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. except during the winter months of 2011, when we met at 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

We sent 18 letters during this time, 17 to the Planning Commission, and one to the joint study session of the City Commission and Board of County Commissioners. Our Chairman also testified several times at these public hearings.

Our discussions and letters centered on the agendas of the monthly meetings of the Lawrence-Douglas County Metropolitan Planning Commission (PC).

> During this time span, the PC was in the process of discussing and adopting several important changes to our Lawrence Land Development Code on which we sent letters: proposed

text amendments (TA) on environmentally sensitive land, Boarding Houses, increasing density in the highest density multiple family district, RM32, a new text amendment



allowing hotels in industrial/business parks, and certain procedural issues dealing with site planning and Letters also included comments on text amendments to our Comprehensive Plan, Horizon 2020, including on the Northeast Sector Plan, and perhaps the most important--the new Chapter 16 of Horizon 2020 on the environment. We also sent a

> letter on a new mixed commercial/ residential district--the MU District--as it was being applied in the Oread Neighborhood. Perhaps the most important letter that we sent was to the PC objecting to the Berry Plastics relocation of their warehouse-printing plant in the Rural Area of Douglas County, and the basis on which it was justified.

PROPOSED BUDGET FOR LWV KANSAS

On March 24th the Board of the League of Women Voters of Kansas approved the attached proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year beginning April I, 2011.

The budget retains the current PMP amounts of \$18 for full members and \$9 for second household members. The amount for each local league is based on membership totals in February I of this year.

The budget includes a \$4000 transfer from the LWVK savings account and \$2000 from the LWVK endowment fund. This may be the last year that we will be able to draw funds from savings to balance the budget.

I am sending this proposed budget to you before the LWVK convention so that you can use the PMP figures in preparing your local budgets. Explanations of budget items and account balances will be available at the convention.

NEWS FROM NATIONAL - LWV-US

Through the Public Advocacy for Voter Protection (PAVP) project, the League continues to battle new barriers to voting in state legislatures across the country. Leagues are working in seventeen states that have voter photo ID (VPID) bills moving in their legislature. To date we believe we have been able to stop legislation in AR, CO, IA, NM and VA. The greatest threats for passage in the next few weeks include OH, TX, KS and SC with prospects for ID laws in MO, MT, NH, PA, RI, TN, and WI increasing. State Leagues


have been working diligently in pushing back these efforts. It's hard to believe that in this time of budgetary crisis and joblessness, legislatures are focused on creating new government programs that will not only cost millions of dollars to enact but also take away people's voting rights.

In <u>a letter</u> calling on President Obama to <u>remedy dysfunction at the Federal Election Commission</u>, the League and its partners urged him to nominate five new commissioners to fix the continuing meltdown.
